California's recycling landscape is undergoing a seismic shift. Currently, packaging waste makes up over 50% of waste in California's landfills by volume. But under a new law, all single-use plastics and packaging sold in California be recyclable or compostable by 2032. The landmark law shifts the plastic pollution burden from consumers and cities to producers by raising \$5 billion from industry members over 10 years. The Rise of E-Bikes

Like many communities, Irvine has seen a drastic uptick in pedestrian and bicycle-involved injuries as electric bicycles have become more popular. While the city supports modes of transportation that reduce traffic congestion and reduce environmental concerns, public safety needs to be considered. Irvine passed legislation enforcing safety regulations for e-bike users. This includes a partnership with the school district that requires students who ride their e-bikes and e-scooters to school to undergo training. As legislation moves forward at the state level, the city of Irvine will share best practices for cities that aim to tackle this locally.
